DEAD CASHIER'S BOOKS IN PERFECT ORDER

Efforts Being Made To Re-open Stilesville State Bank

A check of the accounts of John E. Hicks, cashier of the Stilesville State Bank, who died suddenly Feb. 3 following a stroke of apoplexy revealed that the books were in order, not one cent's shortage and that Hicks' personal account was in balance. The examination was made by Joe McCord, Loo-gootee, state bank examiner and Miss Mildred Surber of Greencastle.

Efforts are being made by officers and stockholders of the bank to reopen it for business as speedily as possible. Milber E. Kendall, well known resident of Hendricks county and a heavy stockholder of the bank was named cashier to succeed Mr. Hicks.

An effort was being made to get all depositors to sign waivers agreeing not to withdraw money now on deposit. The tentative plan is: 10 per cent in May, 1932; 25 percent in November, 25 percent in May 1933; 25 percent in November 1933 and 15 percent in May, 1934. Depositors would also agree to take such payments as the

Depositors would also agree to take such payments as the bank could make in event the foregoing withdrawal schedule could not be maintained after all efforts to maintain it had failed. New deposits would be open to checking at any time. \$10 deposits and under would be payable at any time. It was said that about half of the depositors last week had signed the agreement.

The bank's officers say that unless all the depositors sign the agreement they will not reopen the institution, but will turn it over to the state banking department for appointment of a receiver and liquidation. The bank was closed after Hicks' death when rumors as to its stability gained circulation and a run was started. Frozen loans, according to a statement by the Danville Gazette were the unfavorable liabilities found, and these can be worked off if given time.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Thomas H. Broadstreet Passes Away While on Traction Car.

Thomas H. Broadstreet, of Coatesville, died suddenly on a west bound traction car Saturday morning while the car was near Filmore. He had started to Greencastle to spend the day. It is said he had run to catch the car and it is thought his exertion had something to do with his untimely death.

Mr. Broadstreet was sitting in the smoking department of the car which was in charge of Conductor Lynch. He was in the seat with Edgar Wilson, of north of Coatesville, and when the fatal attack struck him he threw up his hand to his heart, cried out, and fell over in the car seat. His death was almost instantaneous as he was dead by the time he was picked up from where he had fallen. Conductor Lynch said he was in the seat immediately behind Mr. Broadstreet and as this was the third person he had had to die on his car and within a few feet of him, he knew instantly what was wrong when he saw him throw up his hands and fall.

He was 62 years of age and until his removal to Coatesville four years ago had been a resident of Putnam county. He is survived by a widow, a daughter, Miss Clara, a son, Roscoe, a student in DePauw, a brother, Cass Broadstreet, and a sister, Mrs. John Stringer. After his death the body was taken to Greencastle to the home of Chas. P. Broadstreet and then to Coatesville on a later car.

policies, when you reach the age of 60 or 65 years, your rights to disability benefits cease, but with this government insurance, no matter how old you are when the disability occurs, you are entitled to disability benefits. In most cases disability does not occur until the age of 60 or after, so you can see the advantage of the government's provision, which protects you regardless of whether the disability is due to accident or disease. In old age, one out of two persons become disabled.

Value of Disability Clause.

"If it were not for this disability clause, you would run a big risk of losing your insurance because probably you could not keep up your premium payments if disabled. Disability is given the following broad meaning: Any impairment of mind or body which makes it impossible for the disabled person to follow any substantially gainful occupation."

"Misinformed people have often said that war risk insurance is to be turned over to private insurance companies. This is untrue. A reading of the law is all that is necessary to prove the falsity of such a story. Uncle Sam undertook the obligation of this insurance and he will carry it out. Responsible officials of large life insurance companies have cautioned their agents to encourage soldiers, sailors

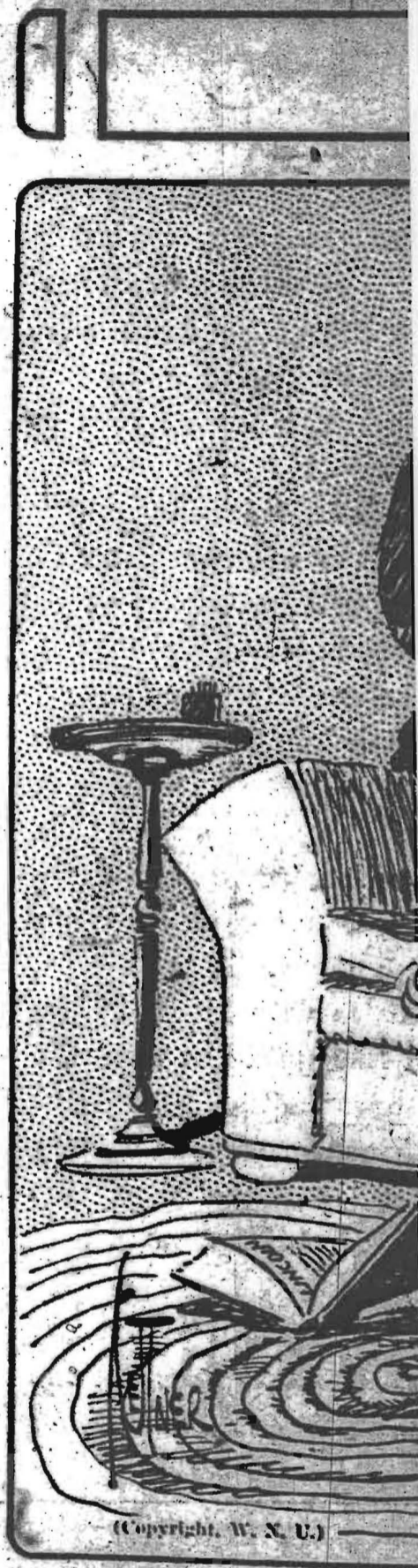
Had Been Cashier of Stilesville Bank
Eighteen Years.

John E. Hicks, age 64, died sudden-
ly at his home in Stilesville, Tuesday
morning, from a stroke of apoplexy
suffered at the Citizen's Bank about
8:30. The funeral is this afternoon
at 2 o'clock from the Stilesville Bap-
tist church with burial in the ceme-
tery there.

Mr. Hicks was cashier of the bank
and had opened the place for business
about 8 o'clock. About 8:30, George
Lineberry, bank clerk, came in and
found Mr. Hicks sitting in a chair in
the rear room with his head bowed
over, breathing hard and unconscious.
Knowing that he had not been in good
health for more than a year he im-
mediately called Dr. F. N. Wright and
they removed him to his home where
he died within a few minutes. Dr.
William O'Brien of Greencastle, had
been called but Mr. Hicks was dead
before he arrived. Coroner W. T.
Lawson was called and following a
short inquest pronounced death due
to apoplexy.
