He is survived by his widow and two sons, Ellis & William Morgan. Funeral services were conducted Saturday at Mason by Rev. J.M. Ackman.

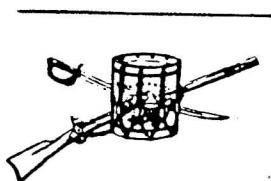

For many years Squire Robinson and his brother Sam Robinson, threshed small grain throughout Grant County. This was the days of the old horse-power thresher. Squire Robinson, like the other brothers and sisters of the family, was a man of fine character. He was a faithful member of the Baptist church at Mason.

Funeral services were conducted at Mason Baptist church last Tuesday. Interment was in the Mason cemetery.

## AN OLD CITIZEN PASSES TO HIS FINAL REWARD

Squire Robinson died at his home on Coopertown Creek, about two miles from Williamstown, Sunday afternoon about 5 O'clock. His death was due to kidney and bladder trouble. He was 78 years of age and had lived in the house where he died for more than half a century.

Squire Robinson was a kindly, inoffensive man, well liked by his neighbors and regarded generally as an honest and upright citizen.

He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. Nat. Biddle.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday and the interment was in the Oak-Ridge Church Cemetery.

## JAMES P. SHINKLE, CIVIL WAR VETERAN, DIED SEPTEMBER 5.

James P. Shinkle, 76 years old, a veteran of the Civil War, and one of the oldest residents of his neighborhood, died at his home on Oak Ridge last Monday morning, Sept. 4, after a brief illness.

His death was due to a bowel disorder, although he had been in rather feeble health for sometime. He was one of the few remaining veterans of the Civil War left in this part of the country, and was probably among the youngest, as he enlisted at a very early age.

Mr. Shinkle had lived at the house where he died for nearly half a century.

## SINCLAIR BILLITER OCTAGENARIAN, DIES.

Sinclair Billiter, eighty-one, years old, died November 16, 1925, at his home on the Cynthiana pike, about two miles south-east of Williamstown. His death was caused by dropsy and ailments incident to old age. He was the oldest resident of the community in which he died, having been born and reared within a few miles of the place of his death.

Sinclair Billiter, Sinc, as he was generally called, was a son of Sanford Billiter, and was an unoffensive man with many excellent traits of character. One child survives him.

His father's family consisted of himself and ten sisters, five of whom survive.

He was buried in the Oak-Ridge Cemetery by the side of his father and mother, who died many years ago.

J.P. Shinkle was born in Braken Co., Ky. July 29, 1846. he was left an orphan at two years of age. He enlisted in the Union Army while still a youth and was a member of Co. K, Fifth Mtd. Infantry. He was married to Margaret Bonar, 4 July, 1867. In addition to the above mentioned family, he is survived by one brother, Wm. Shinkle, two half brothers, Dr. J.E. Leming, and S.B.

## BORDERLAND IS CROSSED BY N.O. NORTHCUTT

Funeral services for N.O. Northcutt, who died at Erlanger last Sunday were conducted at Oak Ridge, Wednesday morning.

Odell Northcutt was born near Independence, Ky. Aug. 15, 1859. He located in Grant Co. when he was 22 years of age and became one of the best known farmers in his community, the Oak Ridge Country.

He married Miss Annie Shinkle daughter of J.P. Shinkle, on the 28th of Feb. 1884. There was no children to this union. He and his wife were married for more than 43 years.

He sold his farm in the Oak Ridge neighborhood and bought another on Barnes pike, near Williamstown, where he and his wife lived until a few years ago when they sold out and went Erlanger.

About four years ago his health failed and he became a invalid. His faithful wife ministered to his every need and made his last days at least comfortable.

Surviving him are, his wife four brothers, Frank, and Bailey Arnold, of Covington, Oscar of Independence, Forest of St. Louis, Mo. One sister, Mrs. T.T. Bird, of Erlanger, and a host of other relatives and friends.
