# LATE SHERIFF HAS TRAGIC END

John Hicks Found Dead At  
Home In New Castle.

Death Due To Bullet From  
Small Caliber Rifle.

Coroner Holds That Fatality  
Was Due To Accident.

HAD BEEN ILL LATELY

New Castle, Ky., April 3.—(Special.)—John Hicks, who retired from the office of Sheriff of Henry county on January 1, was found dead this afternoon in the yard at the rear of his residence in this city, death having been caused by a bullet wound through the brain. Near the body was a 22-caliber rifle, from which it seemed evident that the bullet had been fired.

Death probably occurred about 2:45 o'clock, and the shot that caused it was probably that heard by Mrs. Hicks as she approached her own home from a visit at a neighbor's.

At first the theory of suicide was advanced, but it appears that there is little or nothing to justify it except that for the last few days Mr. Hicks had suffered from la grippe. All the testimony given at the inquest held by Coroner Dowden tended to establish the fact that the shooting was accidental, and a verdict to that effect was returned. It seems that for several days Mr. Hicks had been engaged in an effort to rid his premises of rats, and only the night before had remarked that many of the rodents were too large for his terrier to handle, and that he would have to use a rifle.

**PEDDLER ORDINANCE.**

**Stiff System of License Fees Estab-  
lished At Shelbyville.**

Shelbyville, Ky., April 3.—(Special.)—  
The Board of Council last night passed  
the so-called peddlers' license ordinance,  
which has been pending for nearly a year.  
The purpose of the measure is to afford  
adequate protection to home merchants  
from itinerant vendors by requiring the  
latter to pay for the privilege of selling  
or offering for sale any article of mer-  
chandise, or soliciting subscriptions to  
newspapers, periodicals, etc. Under this  
act no license is issued, for less than a  
year, and it can be used only by the per-  
son to whom it is issued, unless it be  
transferred by consent of the board. No  
firm or corporation taking out a license  
can be represented by more than one  
agent at a time. No stationary headquar-  
ters are permitted, and no wagon from  
which sales are made will be permitted to  
stand within the business district for any  
length of time, and for not longer than  
twenty minutes in the residence section.

The various articles of merchandise are  
divided into twelve general groups and  
license fees ranging from \$10 to \$50 for  
single articles, and from \$15 to \$75 for each  
group, are provided. The penalty is a  
fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25  
for each offense, each day to constitute a  
separate offense.

Farmers selling their surplus produce  
and agents for wholesale houses selling to  
licensed merchants are exempt from the  
provisions of the ordinance.
