Death of H. A. Hicks.

Harvey Allen Hicks was born July 19th, 1830, and raised near Russell's Cave, Fayette county, Kentucky, died at his residence near Richwood, Boone county, Kentucky, August 18, 1902, aged 72 years, 1 month.

He came to Richwood, Boone county, Kentucky, in 1854, was married to Sallie J. Williams and settled on the Mevales farm, where he remained until his death. In 1868 his wife died, leaving no children. In 1870 he was married to Sallie S. Stansifer, daughter of the late Abraham Stansifer. To this union there were born five children, three of whom remain: Mrs. Lizzie Galnes, wife of Leo Galnes, Sam C. Hicks and Mrs. Sallie B. Garrison, wife of Elzie Garrison.

When Mr. Hicks came to Boone county he had only \$1,000. He has bought and paid for 850 acres of the finest land in Boone county, much of which cost a high price. His judgment on fine stock was, perhaps, unsurpassed by any man in Kentucky, always buying the best and so treating it as to make it the best for market. The county has lost one of its best citizens and farmers as well as financiers.

His funeral was conducted by L. Johnson, of Walton, at his late residence, and the remains were laid to rest in Richwood cemetery in the midst of an immense concourse of friends and relatives. To his wife and children the most tender sympathy is extended. L. JOHNSON. Walton, Ky., Aug. 23d.
