1744 William Holloway will, dated 4 December 1744, proven 3 June 1746 Spotsylvania County VA [Spotsylvania County VA Will Book A: 431-432; printed in Carlton M. Dillard, *Back to Old Virginia....*: 14-15]:

In the name of God Amen I William Holloway of the Parish of St. George and County of Spotsylvania in the Colony of Virginia being of perfect sense and memory do make this my last will and testament in manner following.

Imprimis I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Ann Holloway three negroes named Jack a man and Nason and Jonny woman to her and her heirs forever also one negro girl named Milly to her and her heirs forever.

Item I give to my son John two negro men named Tony and Will to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my son Charles two negroes one named Robin a man and the other named Moll a girl to him and his heirs forever. I give to my son George a negro man called Harry and a negro boy called Toboy to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my son Robert a negro man named Sam to him and his heirs forever also a negro girl named Bette to him and his heirs forever also a negro woman named Sarah to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my daughter Elizabeth the wife of Thomas Dillard a negro girl named Judey to her and her heirs forever.

Item I give to my grandson John Robinson a negro man named Peter to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give unto my grandson William Holloway the son of Robert Holloway all my land in King William County to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give the one half of my land in Spotsylvania County unto my loving wife for and during her natural life including the plantation and after her decease I give the same land unto my grandson John Robinson to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give the remainder of my land in Spotsylvania County unto my grandson William Holloway the son of John Holloway to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give unto my daughter Ann the wife of John Robinson a cow and calf to her and her heirs forever.

Item I give all the rest of my estate be it of what nature of quality soever to be equally divided amongst my wife and all my children.

And of this my last will and testament I do constitute and appoint my sons Charles and Robert whol and sole executors, confirming this to be my last will and revoking all other wills by me made in testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of December 1744.

1746 Anne Holloway, widow of William Holloway, renounced legacies and insists on her third share of his estate; William McWilliams, John Parrish, Matthew Gale, and Philip Vincent Vass ordered, once they have appraised the estate, to set aside her thirds; 3 June 1746; [Sparacio, *Spotsylvania County VA Order Book 1744-1746*: 92]

Holloway; a brother, Charles and wife of Drury Bell and her daughter Sally; George Seaton Holloway and his sister, children of Robert Holloway, deceased.

John Holloway guardian to his son William Holloway; surety John Chew; 7 October 1746 Spotsylvania County VA; [Spotsylvania County VA Will Book A; Crozier, Spotsylvania County VA: 71] William inherited property in Spottsylvania William and Anne. Records show that he and his wife, Mary, deeded property on August 5, 1755, the property presumably being the property he inherited from his grandparents.

Elizabeth Holloway and John Holloway were appointed executors of the will of this John Holloway on 12 April 1764; [Dorman, Caroline County VA Order Book, 1764-1765/1:18] John Holloway estate inventory and estate appraisal returned; 12 July 1764; [Dorman, Caroline County VA Order Book, 1764-1765/1: 65] Garland Evans Hopkins in his book Colonial Cousins has William (wife Mary and father of Clarissa Holloway Hill) as the son of this John. This is apparently in error. [Colonial Cousins, by Garland Evans Hopkins, privately issued, 1940]

Notes for William Holloway:

William Holloway of Caroline County died before 17 Jun. 1773. On that date, his apparent widow Mary Mayfield bound out their son John Holloway as an apprentice to Thomas Walker of Fredericksburg, Spotsylvania County. William's widow Mary Holloway had apparently married Mr. Mayfield that same day or before. Thomas Walker was to apprentice the young John Holloway until the age of 21 as a clockmaker. The contract was witnessed by John Chewse (Chew). John Chew had posted security on William Holloway's inheritance of his grandfather's property in 1746, thus supporting the view that William Holloway the heir of 1746 was the father of John Holloway the apprentice of 1773. The young John Holloway began his apprenticeship at the age of 9 years, 8 months, and 7 days (Spotsylvania County Deed Book H, 1771 - 1774: 407-08; see Wright, Spotsylvania County Marriage References and Family Relationships, 69). John Holloway the clockmaker's apprentice was born 10 Oct. 1763. Wright transcribes his age at the beginning of his apprenticeship incorrectly as 8 years, 7 months, and 6 days, as if he were born 1 Nov. 1764. Note that the birth family of William Holloway's widow Mary Holloway Mayfield is unknown. She was not the Mary Smith Holloway named as a daughter in Peter Smith's will of 1 Apr. 1774 (probated Aug. 1774) in Westmoreland County. Mary Holloway had already married Mr. Mayfield the year before on or before 17 Jun. 1773. (For details of Peter Smith's will, see Fosterhill, Wills of Westmoreland County 1654 - 1800, 187). William Holloway's wife has been widely confused with the Miss Carter who seems to have married William Holloway, the grandson of William and Anne through their son Robert. The William Holloway who married Miss Carter seems to have been a first cousin of the William Holloway discussed here.

Notes for William Holloway:

Robert Holloway (c. 1710-bef. 10 Dec. 1748) married Rachel (maiden name unknown). They were the parents of William, who inherited his grandfather's property in King William County. This seems to have been the William Holloway who died in Caroline County in about 1794, the likely father of George, Clarissa, and John. Robert and Rachel also seem to have been the parents of Charles, who died in Caroline County in 1751. A court entry of 10 May 1751 refers to "the children of Robert Holloway."

Upon the death of William in 1794, his lands were divided between his sons, John and George.

Generation 3 (cont.)

Several of John's sons migrated to Henry County, Kentucky along with their aunt Clarissa Holloway Hill, after the death of Clarissa's husband, Samuel.

The wives of William listed here should be taken as possibilities. There is not hard proof of the names of his wife or wives.

The placement of William as the son of Robert Holloway is based on circumstantial evidence. He could have been the son of one of William and Anne's other sons but he certainly seems to be a grandson of William and Anne. William and Anne were known to have two grandsons named William. One was the son of John. For various reasons this William does not appear to be that William. There is no other record of Anne and William having any other grandsons named William except for Robert. William the son of William and Anne's son Robert is named in William's will and received land in King William County, Virginia upon his grandfather's death.

Notes for Frances _____:

Frances Holloway may have been the second wife of William Holloway. She married William Hudson 5 October 1794 Caroline County VA. William Hudson's will dated 10 May 1797, was proven 7 September 1797 King George County VA. Samuel Hill was her attorney when commissioners were ordered to allot her her share of William Hudson's estate [King George County VA Order Books: 6 December 1798, 3 January 1799].

Henry served in the War of 1812, entering service in Bowling Green, Caroline Co., about September 1814. He served his first term from 3 August to 24 September. He was a private in the company commanded by Captain William E. Gray, in the 30th regiment of Virginia Militia, commanded by Colonel Boy of King and Queen Co., VA and major George Washington of Caroline Co. This George was a nephew of the President. Henry served until the end of the war, between 60 and 90 days in two separate terms.

Henry was honorably discharged in January 1815. He was awarded a warrent for 40 acres of land for his service. He, however, never used the warrent. Nineteen years after his death, in 1871, the warrent, which had been misplaced, was sold to Willard Parker.

Henry fell ill of a cholera-like disease in the second month of is trek to California on the California/Oregon Trail. His grave was marked by a large sandstone slab. In 1931 a new stone was reengraved and place at his grave by the Historical Landmark Commission, but it incorrectly stated the date of his death. When Henry died the wagon train was about 35 miles east and south of Ft. Laramie, WY.

Clarissa was born in Caroline County, Virginia, according to the bible of her granddaughter, Phoebe Laurinda Hill, daughter of George Littlewood Hill. She lived in Caroline County, Virginia until about 1815. There is some confusion about the date of her birth. The date given here is the date that was written in the copy book of her son, George Littlewood Hill. However, her tombstone says she was 80 years old at the date of her death. If this is correct, the year of her birth would have been 1767, not 1763. It is possible that George had the correct month and day, but his memory on the year was a little faulty.

She is in the 1810 Caroline Co. Census. She moved to Fayette County, Kentucky around 1815 with her children after the death of her husband, Samuel. Her oldest son was married there in nearby Clark County in 1816. Her second oldest son George was married in Fayette County in 1822. Some time thereafter and prior to 1830 she moved to Henry County, Kentucky where she died on April 10, 1847.

From notes of Zerelda (Hudson) Holloway written about June 5, 1911. The original book is in the possession of Gladys Holloway Mobely:

"A few words concerning Clara Holloway Hill. Clara Holloway was a sister of John and George from England. Writter thinks she married in Samuel Hill in England and immigrated to America several years after her brothers did, and settled in Va and died there. [This is incorrect. She died in Smithfield, Henry Co., Kentucky.] They were wealthy in land and slaves, with all needful surroundings. Samuel Hill was a genuine Englishman with a large strong frame, and a persevering, overbearing temperament and an ungovernable temper, which caused his family much trouble. He was peculiar in his manner of treatment toward his servants and family: he was heard to say to his men 'Well! while we are resting we will go and roll logs;' the horses, were resting. He was clearing the ground for plowing and rolling logs to be burned. After the death of the old folks, the remainder of the family went to KY. to where the Holloways settled."

"They were parents of several children George, Henry, and sister Nancy, who married Samuel Picket [his name was William], there were others whose names are forgotten.

"Henry Hill, a son of Samuel and Clara Hill, married his cousin Elizabeth, daughter of John Holloway from England. The children of Henry and Elizabeth were Martha, Clemencia and Joseph.

"Martha, daughter of Henry and Elizabeth married Stephen Hill. They had the same name but not related.

"Clemencia died in Cal. and was single.

"Joseph married Bettie Hill, a niece of Stephen Hill, not related to each other.

"People should scatter and not marry of the same family live near each other. The Holloways liked their kin too much, and so many married their cousins."

According to Mabel Gaffney's note Zerelda married into the family and moved to Missouri within 2 or 3 years of the time Henry Hill left on the Oregon Trail. Henry's son, Joseph Littlewood Hill, and Zerelda's husband ran a blackSmith shop together.

Zerelda says that Clarissa's older brothers were born in England, This is incorrect. That was a very large Holloway family in Virginia at the time. She was likely a member of that family which would mean her family had been in America for a couple of generations before she was born.

According to a letter from Samuel's daughter-in-law, Louisa (Hickman) Hill and a letter by a granddaughter, The bible of his granddaughter further places Samuel place of birth as Yorkshire, England near Sheffield. The court record of his trial for murder places his year of birth at about 1755.

He is first mentioned on the 1787 Caroline Co., Virginia tax list. This was four years after records began there. Samuel would have been about age 32 at the time. It is assumed that he came to Caroline Co. prior to that time. Several sources provide that Samuel came to America prior to the revolution.

In 1802 he had land on Portobago Creek very near the Essex and Caroline Co. line in St. Mary's parish. Near neighbors were George Watts and Zachariah Carter.

Zerelda (Hudson) Holloway, who married into Clarissa's Holloway family, reported that Samuel had a "fine farm and slaves" and was "very industrious." He was described by her as "a genuine Englishman with a large, strong frame and a persevering overbearing temperament and an ungovernable temper that caused his family much trouble."

Mary and Gawin (also referred to as William) were Samuel and Clarissa's neighbors. According to court records of an action by Mary for an injunction against Gawin and another action for separate support and maintenance, Gawin and Mary had had family problems caused by Gawin's alcoholism. Mary often had to hide in the woods to escape from his beatings which, she disposed, began to occur more frequently in the months leading up to September 1807. She further testified that "his temper and disposition had so changed and brutalized by intemperance that her once happy life was now one of great fear, pain and suffering.

According to court records, Samuel and Gawin had a very bad relationship and had a "habit of quarreling for some time." Gawin threatened to make Samuel "smell gunpowder" more than once. Gawin shot at Samuel twice. The next day, in what was described as "a cool and deliberate action," Samuel shot Gawin in the "left temple and left neck" and killed him instantly.

Samuel was found guilty of murder and was hanged on August 8, 1808 in Fredricksburg, VA

There appears to be some legal relationship between Samuel and Gawin Sommerson. Gawin was legal guardian of one William Hudson and an agent for another. William's first wife was a Sommerson and his second wife was Frances Holloway, probably a relative of Clarissa's. Samuel was the administrator of Frances' estate.

It is possible that his mother's surname was "Littlewood." The middle name of his son, George, was Littlewood. Also the middle name of his grandson, Joseph, son of Henry, was Littlewood. DNA testing indicates that Samuel's birth name may have been other than Hill.

Gray, in the 30th regiment of Virginia Militia, commanded by Colonel Boy of King and Queen Co., VA and major George Washington of Caroline Co. This George was a nephew of the President. Henry served until the end of the war, between 60 and 90 days in two separate terms.

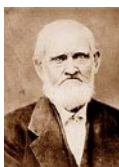
Henry was honorably discharged in January 1815. He was awarded a warrent for 40 acres of land for his service. He, however, never used the warrent. Nineteen years after his death, in 1871, the warrent, which had been misplaced, was sold to Willard Parker.

Henry fell ill of a cholera-like disease in the second month of is trek to California on the California/Oregon Trail. His grave was marked by a large sandstone slab. In 1931 a new stone was reengraved and place at his grave by the Historical Landmark Commission, but it incorrectly stated the date of his death. When Henry died the wagon train was about 35 miles east and south of Ft. Laramie, WY.

Notes for Elizabeth Holloway:

Elizabeth was apparently a cousin of Samuel Clements (aka Mark Twain). Her mother, Lucy Schooler was either a younger sister or niece of Martha (Schooler) Lampton, mother of Samuel Clements.

Notes for George Littlewood Hill:

George L. Hill was born January 12, 1797, in Caroline County, Virginia, near Fredericksburg. He was left fatherless at the age of twelve years, and with his widowed mother moved to Kentucky in 1815, and there took charge of her business, at the age of eighteen years. He then rented land of Lewis Hickman, whose daughter, Louisa V., he married October 20, 1822. While a renter in Fayette county there were born to them three children, Egbert O., Phoebe L., and Sarah L. In the year 1827 he returned to Henry county, Ky., where the remaining five children were born, Lewis S., John H., Emily H., Rodney P., and Benjamin T. In Henry county he purchased 104 acres of heavy timber which he cleared himself. In those early days, when settlers were few, it was the custom for the neighbors to band together and assist in clearing their farms. At such times it was customary to furnish whisky for the crowd. Mr. Hill noticed that his children began to like the sugar in the bottom of the glass and to ask for a little dram. This set him to thinking seriously of the fate that might be in store for them if they learned to like their dram. He and one of his neighbors made a firm resolve to do away with whisky, and concluded that if they could not get help to roll their logs without it they would do their rolling

themselves. At first they were obliged to do their work alone, but their neighbors found them in earnest and at last joined them in their good work.

In the year 1828 he professed religion, and with his wife joined the Baptist Church at New Castle.

Being ambitious Mr. Hill was not content to stay on a small farm, so in 1835 he started out on horseback on a prospecting tour, and while passing through Illinois was delighted with the country. After returning to Kentucky he could think of nothing but Illinois, and in 1836 made a second trip to the State and purchased the farm of 640 acres on which he agreed to pay five dollars per acre. He moved his family to his new home in October, 1837. While in Clinton attending to the purchase of his farm he assisted in raising the third house in town. It was on the west side of the square where the Masonic hall now stands, as was called the Macon House.

He could not immediately sell his farm in Kentucky so he borrowed from an old friend the money to pay for the Illinois farm. He made thirteen trips to Kentucky on horseback during the following twelve years to settle up his own and his mother's estate. As Illinois was then a new State he with his family had to endure many hardships and privations, which were cheerfully borne. To sell his grain he was obliged to haul it to Chicago (then a village) with an ox team, and returning brought with him groceries and salt for the coming year. When his bacon was ready for market he would start for St. Louis, that being the best market for bacon and lard. For breadstuff he had to go to Springfield and Mechanicsburg. When the roads were impassable they had to do without until they were better, and at one time they were six weeks without breadstuff in the house. The next best thing was hominy beaten on a block, and the children did this, taking turns. The finer was sifted out for corn bread and the courser boiled for hominy. When a doctor was needed they had to send to Decatur. That was also the nearest point from which they could get their mail.

One of the hardest privations that he and his wife had to endure was that of having no church privileges, so in his home, on the 1st day of February, 1839, was organized the first Baptist Church of Clinton, and for the following two years meetings were held there. About the year 1846 he gave twenty acres of land to William McPherson, Baptist minister, for a home, and then he built the first Baptist Church in Clinton, furnishing the timber himself, hauling the logs to mill, and doing the work at his own expense. He was deacon of the church for twenty-two years, and faithfully did his duty. For years he furnished the fuel for the church, cutting the wood and hauling it himself. At the time of his death he was the only constituent member of the church he helped to organize, and to which he tenderly attached. He was the oldest pioneer settler known in the county. He was a man of sterling integrity, and was often heard to say that "his word was as good as his bond," and it was never known otherwise. He was never sued in his life. His ambition for himself and his children was for them to be honest and Christian members of society. Mr. Hill's sympathies were with the South in the troubles preceding the war, but when the first gun was fired on Sumter he said, with tears in his eyes, that he could not hold with those who fired on his country's flag, as was after that until his death a strong Republican, casting his last vote for Blaine and Logan. He was an intimate and personal friend of Abraham

Lincoln, who often visited him at his home. His wife preceded him to the better land a little over a year ago. He leaves six children, thirty-one grand-children, and fourteen great-grand-children. He was sick about two months before he died, and little could be done for him but to give him tenderest care which his children lovingly did. His disease was just a breaking up of the system, and he suffered terribly, but through it all his hope and trust in a risen Savior shone clear and bright and sustained him. He did not murmur but said he was ready and anxious to go, only waiting his Master's call. And at the last, when his feet touched the cold stream, his Savior took him gently across, and the peaceful look on his grand old face showed that for him indeed death had lost its sting.

DEATH OF MRS. LOUISA V. HILL

On last Saturday afternoon, at the closing hours of the day, Mrs. Louisa V. Hill passed from death unto life eternal, in the eighty-fourth year of her age. Mrs. Hill was a remarkable woman for one of her years, and till the hour of her death she was in full possession of those keen, sharp faculties for which she had always been noted. Forty-nine years ago, with her husband and children, she came from Kentucky to this county and settled upon the farm where she spent her last days. Mrs. Hill's maiden name was Louisa V. Hickman. She was born in Madison county, Kentucky, on the 14th of December, 1802. When she was but a child her parents removed to Fayette county, where her childhood and the early years of her married life were spent. On the 20th of October, 1822, she was united in marriage to George L. Hill, of Fayette county, Kentucky, and in the same county three of her children were born, in March, 1828, they removed to Henry county, Kentucky, and in the following November she was converted and united with the Baptist church. During the following nine years their five remaining children were born. On the 2d of October, 1837, they left Kentucky for their new home in Illinois, and on the 19th of the same month they reached this county and settled on the farm where they have lived for nearly forty-nine years.

Mrs. Hill was an earnest Christian woman, and in her home the present Baptist church of Clinton was organized on the 1st of February, 1839. During the following three years all the services of the church were held in their home. From the time of her conversion in November, 1828, till her death, Mrs. Hill was a faithful and consistent Christian. Her death, peaceful and calm, was but the triumph of a noble and useful life. The prayer of her life was for the salvation of those around her, and it was a gratification to her to know that all of her children and quite a number of her grandchildren have made a profession of religion. Mrs. Hill was a woman of positive convictions, and was always ready to express and defend what she considered to be the truth.

Mrs. Hill was the mother of nine children, three of whom preceded her to the better land. She leaves her aged husband and six

children to mourn the death of a loving wife and mother. Her surviving children are: Egbert O. Hill, of Ozark, Mo.; Lewis S. Hill, of Alexandria, Minn.; Mrs. Phebe L. Beatty, Mrs. Emily H. Weld, Rodney P. Hill and Benj. T. Hill. Among her descendants are thirty grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

SKETCH OF MRS. LOUISA V. HILL

Some Incidents in Mrs. Hill's Life

When Mr. and Mrs. Hill first went to house-keeping in Fayette county, they lived in a small house on her father's farm. Having no furniture, their bedstead was built in the side of the house. Their first meal was eaten from Mr. Hill's clapboard, with a skillet, a tin cup and a shoe-knife (Mr. Hill being a shoe-maker) as cooking and eating utensils. The way she managed to cook their food was, first she baked her corn-bread, and having no lid to the skillet she had to turn the bread to bake it; then she cooked her meat; and then, washing her skillet, she boiled the water and made her coffee, and having but one cup, they drank their coffee together.

When they moved to Henry county, the place they bought was rough timberland, with no improvement save a small cabin containing one room. While there they improved and cleared the farm, raising cotton and wool, Mrs. Hill doing the carding, spinning and weaving from which the clothes for the family was made. The way she got a start for clothing her family, she spun for a neighbor and got two ewes, and the following spring these ewes had twin lambs. Before she was married she lived with an uncle and took charge of his weaving house, managing one loom and overseeing five others. When her uncle heard what she had done, he sent her six pure Merino sheep, and from these she brought fifty to this county.

One morning her uncle said to his niece and daughters, "Well, girls, I have just driven in sixty milk cows to the pail; now if any of you have any claim on me I want you to make it known." No one spoke but his niece, who said, "Uncle, I don't know as I have any claim on you, but when I am married you may give me a cow." And sure enough, after moving to Henry county, her uncle coming to visit her, brought with him a fine-blooded cow and calf, and from these came the 30 head she brought to DeWitt county with her. Before she was married she was very noted as a weaver. Twice, cloth of her weaving took the silver mug at the State fair in Kentucky. To the present day there is in the family a quilt and many other articles of her own manufacture. For many years after moving here she continued the manufacture of all the clothing for her family.

Never believing in slavery, having been taught from infancy that it was wrong, for her father never would own slaves, she has often said while living in a slave State that she felt like Lot in Sodom and Gomorrah, and his warning appeared to apply to her, "Up, get you out of this place; for the Lord will destroy this city," and when they left Kentucky she made a solemn vow, "If the Lord would let me live to reach a free State never will I make a track on slavery's soil." And she never broke it. Often has she said she never had a desire

to visit her native land, and she never would visit her brother or son in Missouri until it was a free State.

They started from Kentucky October 2d, 1837, in a "Pennsylvania scow-boat wagon," Mrs. Hill riding on horseback, carrying her youngest child, Bennie, in her arms. In their wagon was household goods, 50 pounds of wool carded ready for the wheel, a large amount of linen, cotton, and woolen cloth of her own manufacture; and having a thought of the coming winter she also brought 13 bushels of peaches and 6 bushels of apples of her own drying. Her oldest son, Egbert, walked and drove their cattle. When evening came they would pitch their tent and cook their suppers, also food enough for the next day. At one time they stopped two days and washed, baked their bread, and prepared other food for the remainder of their journey.

On the evening of the 19th of October they landed in DeWitt county and stopped a few days with Mrs. Hill's father, a portion of which is now owned by Hickman Mills. Mr. Hill previously bargained for his place, 640 acres, where the home now is, in the preceding fall after going to Missouri with the intention of buying. The place they bought had a little log cabin containing one room with a dirt floor, a slat door and no window. The fire-place, with a wooden back plastered with mud, the place for the fire being dug out and lower than the floor. The children, to keep warm, used to sit around the edge of the fire-place and hang their feet over next to the fire. Mr. Hill immediately went to work to improve the house. He made a puncheon floor, sawed out a log about as large as three small panes of glass, and tacked a greased cotton cloth over it for a window light. After a time another improvement was made by putting in an oiled paper in place of the cloth. From time to time the house was improved until it had six rooms on the lower floor, two upstairs, and a cellar—as it now stands. After being here several years she got word that her brother-in-law was coming from Kentucky to pay them a visit. Being too proud to have him come and see her puncheon floor, she and her daughter went to work, cut rags, sewed and wove them into a carpet before he reached here. This was the first carpet ever used in a house along Salt Creek, and was regarded as a great curiosity.

When Mr. Hill used to go to Kentucky on business, making 12 trips on horseback in 13 years, she used to manage the farm. At one time while he was away the horses all sickened and died, except a two-year-old colt, which, to use her own words, "never peeped through a collar." Mrs. Hill said, "Leaving my girls to manage the house I took my bonnet and gloves and went to the field with my boys, and by hiring a horse when I could, and borrowing when I could, we broke the ground, planted the grain, and had the corn plowed and laid by when Mr. Hill returned." When out of bread-stuffs, when the day's work was done, she would have the children pick out the corn, and by turns they would pound it on the "old hominy block," sieve out the fine for bread, and use the coarse for hominy.

Her home was used as a place of worship for many years. She would never turn a minister from her door, no matter to which denomination he belonged. When a minister arrived word would be

sent to all the neighbors that there would be preaching, and they would always come. Her house was known far and near as the "Baptist Tavern."

She was always a dear lover of flowers, and her garden, the seeds and bulbs of which were brought from Kentucky, was the wonder of the country round.

Many times has she repeated, and she always made it a point to tell, her three principles: "I am an Abolitionist but not an Amalgamationist, a Republican and a Baptist, and I have brought up all my children in the same way." And they have never departed from her teaching, for she has not a child or grandchild who is not loyal and honors her words.

She was always a great reader and always took great pride in informing herself on questions pertaining to her country, which she loved. But above all else she loved her Bible, having read and re-read it many times. During her last days her Bible was her greatest comfort, for she retained her intellect till the very last. She kept up a large correspondence with her numerous relatives and friends, and until only a few weeks before her death she did her own writing.

Suffering as she did in her last illness, and for many years she has been afflicted, not a murmur or complaint ever passed her lips. Always a prayer for the Lord to give her strength to bear her burdens. She was ready to go and was only waiting her Maker's call. Her last days were a constant prayer for the Lord to relieve her sufferings. Her last words spoken to her daughter, Mrs. Emily WELD, were, "Oh, my child! I shall soon be to the Golden Gate. Jesus is by my side and is leading me across the River of Jordan, and all is bright. Tell all my children to meet me in Heaven."

She was always a thorough-going, earnest, consistent Christian woman, always free spoken on any subject, always ready in the hour of sickness and trouble to minister to the wants of her neighbors—a kind, indulgent and affectionate mother and friend.

Agreeable to her request, the Rev. D. Mac ARTHUR conducted the funeral services, which were held in the church she helped to establish and build up in Clinton. A large number of the old settlers united with her family and friends in paying the last tribute to her memory.

Notes for Anne Clarissa Hill:

In 1850, Ann is living with her son Samuel and his wife Mildred. There is considerable confusion about Ann's name. Her brother, George Littlewood Hill, in his copy book refers to her as "Ann Fisher Hill." Some Pickett descendants say her name was Ann Frances Hill. There is also some confusion about the date of birth. If "Ann Fisher" is the same person as our Nancy, George Littlewood Hill has her date of birth as April 25, 1801, while a Pickett descendant has her date of birth as September 30, 1799. In the 1850 Monroe County census she is listed as

Nancy A.. In the 1860 census she is listed as Claraey. In the 1870 census she is listed as Nancy. Since during the time she was born Nancy was a common nickname for Ann, her name was probably Ann Clarissa Hill and her nickname was probably Nancy.

William and Anna lived first in Fayette Co., Kentucky, but within a few years moved to Henry Co., Kentucky, where her mother, Clarissa and brothers all eventually moved. William and Anna owned 50 acres in Henry Co. on the Little Kentucky River. They sold their land in Henry Co. in October 1837 and moved to Monroe Co., Missouri where her brother, Henry, have moved a short time before. They bought 80 acres of land not far from Ann's brother Henry.
